THE AIR RESCUE ASSOCIATION 2024 RICHARD T. KIGHT AWARD Capt. Bradley T. Joyal



Captain Bradley T. Joyal distinguished himself as Chief of Standardization and Evaluations, 79th Rescue Squadron, 563d Rescue Group, 355th Wing, Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona, from 01 July 2023 to 30 June 2024. Captain Joyal led nineteen aviators through the execution of 2,100 hours of uninterrupted Combat Search and Rescue alert coverage in support of Operation INHERENT RESOLVE. He directed five alert launches, two casualty evacuations, 127 sorties, 323 combat hours, and organized forty-two members in a directed dispersal where he oversaw the organic establishment of a forward operating site, generated six missions, and mitigated threats from the onset of the Israel-Hamas conflict. The distinctive accomplishments of Captain Joyal reflect credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

THE AIR FORCE JOLLY GREEN 2024 RESCUE MISSION OF THE YEAR AWARD

Pedro 11 flight, Witchdoctor, and King 91

for superior airmanship epitomizing the motto "THESE THINGS WE DO THAT OTHERS MAY LIVE"



Pedro 11 flight, Witchdoctor, and King 91 distinguished themselves on 25 Aug 2023 while assigned to the 303rd, 82nd, and 81st Expeditionary Rescue Squadrons, 449th Air Expeditionary Group, 435th Air Expeditionary Wing, Camp Lemonnier, Republic of Djibouti. On that day, Pedro 11's flight of 3 HH-60Ws and King 91's HC-130 launched on a no-notice casualty evacuation of twelve critically wounded soldiers on a six-hour mission. Through adverse weather, aircraft malfunctions, and a dynamic threat picture, Pedro 11 flight landed and egressed in reduced visibility while Witchdoctor administered lifesaving care and King 91 coordinated overhead. Pedro 11 flight pushed beyond reserve fuel to ultimately save all 12 lives. The distinctive accomplishments of Pedro 11 Flight, Witchdoctor, and King 91 reflect credit upon themselves and the United States Air Force.



AIR FORCE RESCUE SQUADRON OF THE YEAR AWARD TO

58th Rescue Squadron



58th Rescue Squadron, 563d Rescue Group, 355th Wing, Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona from 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024. During this period, the 58th accepted a short notice six-month deployment and six-month alert for Human Space Flight Support despite a one-third loss of its Unit Type Codes as it began a service-directed inactivation. Moreover, the squadron stood-up Special Warfare Team One for an eighteen-month effort to integrate Guardian Angel and Tactical Air Control Party to solve near-peer problems for the Combat Air Force. Finally, the 58th demonstrated novel maritime tactics in the Indo-Pacific, gaining the Pacific Air Force Commander's immediate request for operational support of Special Warfare Teams. The distinctive accomplishments of the 58th reflect credit upon itself and the United States Air Force.

GREETINGS FROM PEDRO RESCUE HELICOPTER ASSOCIATION

Rick Sheets, President, PRHA

PRHA is excited to merge our membership with ARA. The members took a vote with unanimous consent to move forward with this merge. I am Rick Sheets and am currently serving as President of the PRHA. It is my great pleasure to introduce PRHA and its membership to you.

PRHA was conceived in 1999 by our treasurer and his father, TSgt Taylor, deceased. TSgt James A. Taylor contacted a few other members. TSgt Taylor began contacting those who would be our first members. With Don VanMeter's assistance, Chris Taylor began the work of incorporation and the Association was incorporated in the State of Washington on January 28, 2000.



The idea was to form an association for the purpose of education. A comment was made by one of the USAF Museum Administrators at the first reunion that people forget there was another group of folks that performed rescue in SEA. That often forgotten group was Pedro.

Pedro, HH-43 has a large and storied history regarding its work in SEA. The history of the men that crewed the HH-43 may be even larger. A couple of facts, the HH-43 had more saves in SEA than any other single helicopter. It was the first in and last out. One of our current members Lt. Col. Fred Bergold (Retired) flew the final mission in 1975. One of our members is Col. (Retired) Tom Curtis; he spent $7 \frac{1}{2}$ years as a POW after being shot down while attempting a rescue of an F-105 pilot. Along with him was his co-pilot 1st Lt (KIA) Duane Martin and AIC Bill Robertson, crew chief and A3C Neil Black, PJ. The last 2 were POWs as well.

The PRHA placed 4 monuments, 1 each at The Enlisted Heritage Hall, U.S. AF Academy, Lackland AFB, and the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force. The monuments pay respect to William Pittsenbarger a PJ and Medal of Honor recipient and gives a brief history of the HH-43. I would encourage you if the opportunity arises to seek on out and look at it. A picture of each side of the monument is included. They are designed very well and will make you proud that we are part of ARA soon.

We look forward to seeing you at the Symposium in October of 2025 at Ft. Walton Beach.

RESCUE STORIES OF TODAY

"**Hiker Rescued by USAF Team**," originally published November 14, 2024 by 1Lt Will Witherow, 58th Special Operations Wing, Kirtland AFB, NM

On 26 October 2024 a hiker in the Caldera Mountain range suffered a nearly 30 foot fall off a ledge on the side of the trail. The injured hiker's companion then called local emergency responders for help since he could not reach him down the cliff. After responding to the scene, the local emergency team decided that the injured hiker needed to be airlifted to a hospital. With the fall happening at a dangerous and remote location, the teams that would normally respond to this situation were not able to provide the airlift.

The call came in to the 58th Special Operations Wing at 1750 that the hiker needed to be rescued and taken to the hospital. Major Joshua Hartmann, Detachment 2 Director of Operations, took the call and immediately began coordinating between Detachment 2 and emergency personnel to get a UH-1N "Huey" team to the scene. A brave team made up of Major Kevin Cornell, Mission Commander and Pilot, Captain McClain Cardoso, Co-Pilot, and Staff Sergeant Robert Benson, Special Missions Aviator, stepped up and volunteered to be the rescue team. Due to the

extensive injuries and precarious spot on the mountain, the rescue team was augmented to include the 351st Special Warfare Training Squadron. Technical Sergeant Roman Ramirez, Pararescueman Instructor, heroically joined the rescue team.

After getting the necessary approvals to complete the mission, the rescue team of USAF Rescue 65 took off from Kirtland Air Force Base for a 1-hour flight to the mountain range. From the beginning, the team knew that they would be limited by fuel issues but bravely pushed on anyway. They arrived at the injured hiker's location to find that he was on a steep slope and only 50 feet from the edge of another cliff that he was lucky to not have continued his fall down. SSgt Benson began assessing the

situation with the team, determining an inability to land and being forced to hover 40 feet from the side of the mountain. "The terrain was extremely dangerous to try to maintain a hovering position with the wind from the mountain and having to dodge fallen trees to find the right spot to lower Ramirez." explained Capt Cardoso.

Aiming in between the trees, TSgt Ramirez was lowered down 120 feet and made his way up the slope through extremely slick terrain to reach the hiker. Luckily, the local emergency responders had provided the hiker with initial medical attention, so TSgt Ramirez was able to focus on getting the hiker ready to be hoisted to the Huey. Ramirez assessed that the hiker had sustained a possible broken back, broken right ankle, multiple broken ribs, and a broken wrist so he had to be placed on a stretcher to be loaded into the Huey. While Ramirez was on the ground trying to get the hiker ready to be transported, the aircrew team was constantly fighting the terrain to maintain their hovering position and had to make two passes before they were able to get back in position to receive the stretcher and hoist Ramirez back into the aircraft.

Benson was constantly monitoring the fuel levels and knew they needed to head to the UNM Hospital in Albuquerque immediately after Ramirez made it back into the aircraft. They began their flight to the hospital and landed at nearby Johnson Field where they were met by the hospital's medical team to receive the hiker at 2233. Once they ensured the hiker was safely transferred to the hospital staff, the team headed back to the base where they landed with only 4 minutes of fuel left in the Huey.

This mission shows how the USAF training programs are producing the highest quality Airmen in the world that always stand ready to answer the call of our nation. Our members are trained to adapt to whatever the situation calls for and can work as an effective team to rise to the challenges they face. The 58th SOW is incredibly proud of our members for their heroic actions and honored to work with our partners at the 351st SWTS.




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RESCUE STORIES OF YESTERDAY

Area of operations Thailand, Laos, & North Vietnam – published in "Pedro News", Jan2005

On 18 Nov64 "Ball 03", one of two F-100Ds escorting a "Yankee Team" RF-101C reconnaissance mission, was shot-down while exchanging fire with an enemy antiaircraft gun position. "Ball 03" 's Wingman called "dropkick" (a distress signal used in place of mayday to confuse any listening enemy troops) to the Air America Air Operations Center in Vientiane, reporting that "Ball 03" had crashed just south of Ban Senphan in central Laos near the North Vietnamese



border. The Air America Operations Officer in the Operations Center diverted a C-123 to reconnoiter the area and act as an Airborne Controller until relieved by a USAF HU-16B from Korat AB. Once in position, "Tacky 44", the HU-16B, requested that US Navy A-1 Skyraiders fly to Ban Senphan, to search for wreckage and the pilot, and suppress any enemy opposition if it were encountered.

Within minutes of their arrival on the scene, the Navy Skyraiders received ground fire from Pathet Lao emplacements near the location that "Ball 03" was believed to have been shotdown. The A-1's attacked the gun positions taking minor flak and small arms hits to their aircraft. During the action, one of the Skyraider pilots spotted what appeared to be a burning crash site in the jungle approximately five miles away from the coordinates originally furnished.

Two HH-43B's were put on alert and launched with DET. Prov.3, PARC crewmembers (those TDY from 33 ARS, which were being replaced by DET. Prov.2 crews arround this date), then proceeded the 10 miles to the Mekong River near Nakhon Phanom and Thakhek, Laos. At that time, the US Ambassador's permission was required to cross the Mekong River into Laos and the

crews did not receive this permission during their holding orbits on the Thai side of the river. Running short of fuel, both aircraft returned to NKP for refueling.

At the same time, a C-124C landed at NKP with departure destination Naha AB, Okinawa (returning the aircraft and crews to 33 ARS).

TWO of the original pilots, knowing that they were being replaced by the DET. Prov.2 guys, asked Jim Sovell and myself if we would take their place. Jim and I said yes. They got on the C-124C and went home and a few minutes later both aircraft were launched, this time with clearance to cross the Mekong and with Jim and I on board as co-pilots. I believe Jim Crabbe was Aircraft Commander, TSgt Reed was the Flight Engineer and SSgt Bennett the PJ.

Shortly after we crossed the Mekong River, we picked up two U.S. Navy A-1 Skyraiders for cover. We were sent to investigate a fire in the jungle which approximated the shootdown coordinates. The call-signs for our two HH-43Bs were "Pansy 88" and "Pansy 89". We flew blindly into Laos with no intel as to where the bad guys were. To our knowledge, we encountered no groundfire nor did we see any bad guys. The fire was just that – a jungle fire and not one caused by a crashed F-100D. We made our way back to NKP without any complications.

Before darkness temporarily ended the rescue efforts, the HU-16B coordinated thirteen F-105s, eight F-100s, six Navy A-1's, two HH-43Bs, and a pair of Air America Sikorsky H-34 's in a concerted effort to find and rescue the downed pilot.

The coordination and control of these diverse elements provided a preview of SAR efforts that would be conducted over the next decade

19 November 1964: Airborne at first light, "Tacky 65", another HU-16B, pilot Capt. Weeden, from Korat AB, and four F-105s returned to the Ban Senphan area. At mid-morning the On-scene Commander in "Tacky 65" sighted the pilot's parachute and the wreckage on a rocky outcropping only fifty yards from the nearest anti-aircraft position. As the F-105's attacked the gun position, "Tacky 65" ordered the HH-43Bs at Nakon Phanom and their propeller driven escorts to be launched. However, poor weather conditions kept the helicopters grounded for nearly two hours, before a pair of Air America H-34's took off and joined four American piloted T-28s out of Savannahket. "Tacky 44", a second HU-16B, pilot Capt. Kaiser, relieved "Tacky 65" as the Onscene Commander and began to control the rescue effort. Upon arrival at the crash site the copilot from one of the Air America choppers was lowered to the ground. He found that the pilot had died of injuries sustained when he landed on the karst. The pilot was recovered, wrapped in his parachute, and flown to NKP. "Tacky 44" flew the remains to Don Muang AB, Bangkok.

When the Air America H-34 pilots dropped into NKP prior to their mission, they asked if we had any weapons that they could borrow, as, at the time, they carried none. We loaned them a couple of BARs and carbines. They also informed us when we told them of our mission the previous day, that we were very lucky guys as the route we took in and out was right through "Injun Country" and loaded with bad guys. Ignorance is bliss, sometimes. Someone was looking out for us.
